This correction is for the following article by Frasca et al. (1997) entitled "Mycoplasmal conjunctivitis in a European starling," which appeared in the *Journal of Wildlife Diseases*, Volume 33(2), pages 336–339. Due to an editorial error an incorrect statement was included in the Abstract of this article. The erroneous phrase is part of the sentence which begins on line 9 of the Abstract and reads, "However, the histologic lesions were distinct, by the presence of ulceration and epithelial hyperplasia and lacking a lymphoplasmacytic infiltration." The corrected statement

should read, "However, the histologic lesions were distinct, by the presence of ulceration and by the absence of epithelial hyperplasia and lymphoplasmacytic infiltration."—S.
